







LITTLEHAM & LANDCROSS PARISH COUNCIL.

Dear Residents

I can report on a successful Littleham and Landcross Wild Again event on 16th March which the Council was part of the funding and organisation in partnership with the Biodiversity Group. Councillor Rosemary Gent was one of



the key figures in the previous events and it was a poignant memory of her work. A memorial service for Rosemary was held in the Village Hall on 19 March organised by the Bideford Music Group and prior to the event a tree was planted in Rosemary's memory.

The Council through its links with Torridge District Council has been in discussion with the North Devon and Torridge Councils Sustainability and Climate Officer regarding a project focused on decarbonisation of Rural areas. It is envisaged that private residents and community buildings might benefit from renewable energy sources.

Without many fixed assets or a specific service delivery the Council can focus on issues around the threats of biodiversity loss and climate change. One thing that came to my mind was a Devon Wildlife Trust leaflet entitled "Is your garden Hedgehog friendly?" Small changes can make a difference and a few examples are: don't use slug pellets or pesticides, provide log piles, long grass, rotting leaves and nectar rich flowers - if you would like a copy of the leaflet let me know.





Thoughts of a new Bellringer

I love to hear the sound of church bells ringing. For me it's a symbol of an active village community and a reminder of our history. When I heard Weare Giffard were looking for new bellringers, I put my name down without hesitation but it was April 2023 before I got my opportunity to start learning.

I arrived at my first training session feeling nervous and wondering whether I would be able to meet the expectations of the other bellringers. I needn't have worried as I was one of two new students on that first day and a whole hour was set aside with one to one tuition. On week two I was taken up the tower and received a full explanation of how the bells, stays and sliders work. Fascinating, but not being good with heights, it's not an experience I will want to repeat in a hurry!!

After my first session I stayed on for a while to watch the experienced team have their weekly practice. Easy I thought – that'll be me in a couple of months, but the reality has been very different. Bellringing is harder than it looks! I found it difficult initially to control the bell. I would regularly 'lose it' and need to be rescued by my trainer. It was frustrating at times and I recall going home one evening after about 2 months vowing that if I didn't perform any better the following week I was going to give it up – I would never be a bellringer. The following week turned out to be better with hints of what it can be like when you find your rhythm and have some technique. I was determined to get to a stage where I could ring in sequence with other members of the team.

Practice, practice and more practice. At times I thought I'd never find a consistent rhythm that would allow me to join the experienced ringers, but I have managed it. It was a great feeling to be part of the ringing team on Easter Sunday. I still have lots of work to do before I'm totally

competent – but I love it. I want to thank Steve Hoile and Kev Richards for their commitment to my training, and the rest of the bellringers for their patience, encouragement and ongoing support . I would also like to apologise to members of the village who have had to endure the monotonous one bell toll during my very lengthy training period!!



HISTORY WALKS WEARE GIFFARD - SPRING/SUMMER 2024.

Unfortunately, this is likely to be the last year these walks will be available, lead by myself. There are 3 walks available, and a brief outline of each is below. Each walk is around 1.5 - 2 hours.

Walks this year will be 'by demand' i.e. if sufficient numbers show an interest and register this interest with myself, a date mutual to all will be arranged. When registering an interest, please indicate the WALK NUMBER. Thanks.

WALK NO 1. PARISH CHURCH TO THE OLD CORN MILL

This walk will start at The Church and cover:- Why Weare Giffard?; The River Torridge; The Church and Graveyard;

a sad 'industrial' grave; External of WG Hall; Our piano entrepreneur; The Lost Pub; The Village School; Robert Smith war artist; The Quay; The Fortescue Arms; The Riddle of the River – novel; 'Weare Mills Orchard'; The Park; The Weare Giffard 'Rat'; The Old Corn Mill including it's mill leat and race.

WALK NO 2. THE CYDER PRESSE TO CHOPES BRIDGE

This walk will start outside of the Pub and will cover:- Why Weare Giffard?; The River; Tavern Gardens; A Village Shop; A (very) ancient track; The first school – 1671; The Methodists; The Old Forge; Murder most foul; Where is Stoney Bridge?; The first ford above Bi-de-ford; Why Vine Cottage?; The Old Tucking Mill; An ancient Bridge; The Mill Leat Aqueduct; Weare Giffard's role in the film 'Tarka the Otter'; Henry Williamson's 12 Oak Field.

WALK NO 3. BERRY CASTLE, IRON AGE HILL FORT

This walk will start at Foxes Cross, Huntshaw (directions to attendees), and will cover:-

A tour of the actual settlement (hill fort); putting it into its context of the nearby Roman Marching Camp; and will cover all aspects of this site and period – to the best of our current knowledge, and especially that of your guide!! Plus a very recent LIDAR find!!!

GENERAL:-

The walks will all be either a Saturday or Sunday and will start at either 10.30 or 2.30p.m.; with day and time being decided by sounding out the availability of registered attendees.

A small donation of £5 will be asked, this to go towards other W.G. history projects, e.g. Oral History Recording.

If the 2.30 p.m. time is chosen, there is a strong possibility of finishing with a cuppa and cake in the leaders garden! If showery, we walk; if tipping down we POSTPONE. **ANNERY KILN & SEA LOCK** area is covered by The Rolle Canal Society :- Saturday 6th July 2.30 p.m., meet at Annery Kiln. See their web site for other Rolle Canal walks over the spring and summer.


